In and around the classrooms:

Static Electricity

The Year 4 Class has been busy investigating **forces** through some experiments in the classroom and at home. Last week we explored **Static Electricity**. Over the week, girls were able to get water from a tap to bend, enable a balloon to pull along a Coke can without touch, help a balloon attach itself to a wall, and finally the class could create a static charge to lift tissues from their tabletop.

Sustainable Living

As we are learning about **sustainable living** in Geography, the girls produced a windmill that could pull a cup up and push it back down. With the help of the hairdryer, many groups were able to get the blades on the windmill to move. After further investigating renewable energy, the group communicated the positive, negative and interesting facts about wind energy.

Growth Mindset in the Primary School

A continued focus in the Primary School has been developing a Growth Mindset in our students. What is Growth Mindset you ask? Stanford University psychologist Carol Dweck has done decades of research and has found that our mindset affects whether we can learn to our full potential. If we can help our students develop growth mindsets this will impact their experience in school dramatically. Dweck's work has shown that with a growth mindset, students' motivation and grades both improve.

Fixed Mindset: you believe that human qualities are carved in stone. Students who believe this are less likely to put in effort. They view challenging work as something that just reveals your efficiencies as opposed to something that helps to make you smarter. Leads to a desire to look smart.

Growth Mindset: you believe that through your own efforts you can improve your qualities. Students who believe their intelligence can grow are more willing to put in effort and seek out challenges. They also enjoy learning more.

Teaching a growth mindset helps create motivation and productivity.


Young Women in Technology Mathematics 10A | Weds 6 June

As part of the Year 10 Mathematics A curriculum, nine students took part a Young Women in Technology workshop at Adelaide University. This event provided an opportunity for the girls to engage with academics from the Faculty of Engineering, Computer and Mathematical Sciences, student ambassadors, industry representatives, and apply their problem-solving, communication and teamwork skills.

The girls discovered the importance of well-designed networks by simulating water flow from a reservoir through a village via pipes of differing thickness. They also learned the chemistry behind perfume making, experienced life on an offshore oil rig through virtual reality and analysed the mechanics behind designing racing cars.

This event was designed to encourage girls to think beyond their comfort zones and keep options open for higher level study by choosing SACE Mathematics subjects that are higher than the ones they may be currently considering. The workshops also provided opportunity to experience the skills that may be developed as a result of choosing higher Mathematics subjects and how they may be transferrable to a variety of career pathways.

Adelaide Zoo

Year 12 Tourism

The Year 12 Tourism class ventured to the Adelaide Zoo last Friday, June 8. Despite unfavourable weather forecasts, we had excellent conditions in which to conduct our research.

Our brief was to collect evidence of how the Adelaide Zoo manages the, at times, competing demands of the three agendas of the model for tourism sustainability.

These three agendas are **financial, social and environmental**.

The Zoo's Tourism Manager, Dylan Beach, spent over 2 ½ hours with us. He took us around the Zoo and we stopped frequently so he could point out strategies and initiatives the Zoo uses to achieve its goals. After this we moved around the Zoo and collected more data to complement the secondary sources we have studied, including the Zoo's strategic plan.

He pointed out that whilst conservation of animals is the #1 priority of the Zoo, to remain financially viable some compromises had to be made in order to provide a visitor experience that would hopefully lead to repeat visits and positive recommendations to others.

Examples of strategies in place include:

ECONOMIC:

Availability of memberships, private functions, relationships with other local tourism ventures, incentives like a discounted '2 zoos pass, animal encounters [for an extra fee].

SOCIAL:

The provision of a good quality parents' room, absence of steps anywhere in the zoo to aid mobility restricted visitors, lower counter levels, companions enter the Zoo free when assisting a person with some form of disability and information in multiple languages.

ENVIRONMENTAL:

Discounted water rates from SA Water, all waste being converted to fertilizer for retail sale, water fountains around the zoo to discourage purchase of bottled water, animal enclosures that included water cleaned once a week, all lights and taps at the Zoo are on timers to avoid unnecessary usage, aiming to reduce as far as possible single use plastic items.
