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FOR Sr. Rose Columba Frear OP. (1926 - 2016) delivered by Sr. Noreen Reynolds OP, Friday 18 November 2016

Margaret Mary Frear, the only child born to Eileen and Fred Frear, was born in the Parkside Private Hospital on 9th January 1926. She grew up in Parkside and had six different addresses before she came to us and you will discover she has travelled far and wide since then to spread the Gospel.

ose has had close Dominican connections virtually Kall her life having received all her primary and secondary education at St. Mary's College, Franklin Street. She was an asthmatic and had missed guite a lot of school. She left school before intermediate on exemption because of poor health. Her first job of packing dry fruits at Gordon Sim Choon in the Christmas holidays was short lived - she had an encounter with a rat in the cellar - and from then on she looked after the Sim Choon children! In the New Year she as a shop assistant at Woolworths and stayed there about four years. During her six years of employment at John Martins, Rose worked her way through to the main office. The Office Manager recognised her potential and sent her to learn "electric book keeping" which she enjoyed very much.

Meanwhile she felt a nagging call from God to be of service to others but continued to do what young girls did, like making her debut at the Catholic Subscription Ball in 1944, going to dances and playing lots of sport. Finally after much soul searching and guidance, she gave in and joined this community of about 55 Sisters on 15 August 1949. Her Catholic mother and father of no professed religion had hoped for grand children and were disappointed at her decision but they did not deter her.

The following May Margaret (or Peg as she was generally known) received the Dominican habit. <u>There are many of versions of how she got her religious</u> <u>name</u>. She would have been happy with **anything** but a double barrelled name. What did she get? Rose Columba. In a book marking the centenary of the chapel opening in 1893, Rose claimed it a <u>privilege to bear the</u> <u>name</u> of Rose Columba Adams OP, who led the first band

of Dominican Sisters from Stone, Staffordshire, England to establish this community. **However**, let me quote from her own autobiography:

"Apparently, Sr Bertrand, a sister who had been a novice when Mother Rose Columba was alive, felt that I reminded her of our foundress. However, my contemporaries brought me down to earth by saying that Sr. Bertrand was not only old, but she was deaf and blind and very stooped: so what would <u>she</u> know?"

first came into contact with Rose when she taught me in a combined 6/7 class. We were all invited to her final profession - at least 3 of us are here today. Perhaps that is where the seeds of my own vocation began?

Again to use her own words about this magnificent chapel which was conceived, designed and virtually paid for by the substantial dowry of her namesake:

Most of our Sisters have vowed their lives to God and the service of his people kneeling at the altar there. Also for most it will be there that we farewell the rest of our Community: when our work has been completed here on earth

Whatever Rose lacked in formal education in her early years was certainly redressed as you can see from her impressive list of studies undertaken in person or by correspondence and all for accreditation. Most of this was done after a full day in the classroom. Like the wise virgins in today's Gospel,

she was always well prepared and equipped herself for the next ministry cf her CV. As her motto indicates, Rose accepted current needs as God's will and readily obeyed when asked to teach (mainly Year 7) at Prospect, Findon, Salisbury or SDPC to as well as filling fill the role of principal or local superior in some of these places. The readings were all chosen today because somehow they epitomised some aspect of Rose' long and extraordinarily loving and fruitful life in all its contemplative and active aspects. We English Dominicans have a strong Benedictine influence so it's not surprising that Rose exemplified their motto *Laborare est Orare* to work is to pray.

One turning point in Rose's life was soon after her 50 year old mother died. She volunteered to go to the missions in the Solomon Islands. Again I quote her:

No sacrifice was too great for me at this time; because I felt that the greatest sacrifice had already been asked in her dying. The missions and its people brought home to me the simplicity of life and the beauty of God's creation. There was very little to distract one from God's presence ... no phones, motor cars, TV, and the radio only at limited times.

She had spent a short time in Sydney before departure getting to know Sr Noelle Magree (Paul Francis op) who was going up as a nurse. On arrival they were both posted to the small island of Nila in the Shortlands. Rose had never seen a baby born before and one of her great joys was to be called upon by Noelle at night to help at the birth. Her job was mainly to pacify thew mother whilst Noelle did the delivery. The joy of seeing a baby born was something Rose would never forget. She claims that the success of the Dominican mission was largely due to the nurses. The islanders could see the dedication, and wonderful care provided by the nurses and were completely won over. They set the tone and the teachers had to live up to that, in a different way, of course. One other thing was the naming of babies after the missionaries, and when they ran out they started on the families. There is a little Fred running around

the Solomons somewhere and countless Roses bear her name and keep alive the memory. Noelle died in Melbourne about six weeks ago so they may well be reminiscing on the old days.

have not even touched on her time as parish worker or hospital chaplain but this sketch should give a good idea of how she threw herself into it and supported patients, their families and her colleagues.

As you see, Rose was no slouch. If you're exhausted from listening to this list of achievements, just spare a thought for us who tried to keep up with her!!!! When Rose could no longer drive a motor car and her health was diminished by surgery and years, she reluctantly accepted a walking stick and later a frame in a desperate bid to remain mobile and independent. Up to about a month ago she used the walking stick around the house and across to St. Laurence's, or the walking frame for longer distances. Regardless of extreme weather conditions, she'd take several walks a day "to keep strong" – often as far as O'Connell St for shopping, or a medical appointment and she offered to run errands for us at the North Adelaide Post Office etc.

We are deeply indebted to the medical staff at the RAH, the Little Company of Mary and those who cared for Rose in Mary Potter Hospice in those final weeks. In a sense it was a home coming because Rose had provided pastoral care at Calvary Hospital for 11 years; some staff and volunteers still remembered her.

Year 7 French Excursion to Maritime Museum

On Tuesday, 15th November, the Year 7 French Class visited "*The Art of Science-Baudin's Voyages 1800-1804*" exhibition at the Maritime Museum. There, the students viewed paintings, artefacts and treasures from French navigator and explorer, Nicolas Baudin's four-year voyage to chart the southern regions of Australia. They saw original maps with the French names given by Baudin & his men, drawings of the "strange", new fauna & flora which was discovered and the indigenous people they met.

As our girls explored the exhibition and completed their tasksheet, they learnt about earlier methods of navigation and scientific research, including the preservation of animal and plant material. They also admired the intricate drawings which were the only way to record what had been seen before the invention of photography.

This excursion combined elements of French, History, Geography, Science and Art. It made the students aware of the historic links between France and South Australia, in particular, links which now comprise the current submarine project.


