Dear Parents.

As the final two weeks of term draw to a close there is much to be glad about and, around the planet much to pray for. Belonging in a community where people are welcomed and respected and safe is the privilege we enjoy. At present our thoughts and prayers are with our fellow Australians in Queensland as they face the long journey back from a flooded world and the great dislocation they are facing. For others there is the tragedy of losing a family member in the floods.

Easter Reconciliation and Reflection

In the fast moving lives of your family and your daughter's school there are many deadlines to meet study to be done. The world of family and workplace lays many pressures on us with not much time to stop and reflect. In the school you have chosen for your children, we hope that their experience of being still and reflective is something that they will hold on to in their lives. Today was a special time for students and staff to do this as we gathered our Year 7 - 12 students for the Liturgy of Reconciliation in preparation for Easter. This was followed by an opportunity for individual reconciliation with Fr James Valledares and Fr. Tony Densley.

The photograph on this page is the central image which was part of yesterday's Reconciliation viz., of Jesus' Crucifixion symbolised by the cross and the crown of thorns. The new life of resurrection is symbolised by the living plant. At the base of the cross is a large heart shape representing both the love of God for us, and our love for those who are in need. In the spirit of the Caritas Lenten theme, "Love your Neighbour," it is coin money which is placed all over the heart, symbolising our giving to project Compassion in 2017.

Parent-Teacher Interviews with parents of Primary classes have already begun.

Planned Absences from School

Coming home with the term one reports will be a clear outline of the procedure for informing the school of any planned absence you intend to take during a school term. As you know we have clearly conveyed our hope that you will keep any reduction of your daughter's educational program to a minimum. If you are taking your daughter away there are groups which are needing to have this information from you. Those groups and individuals are: the Principal (by letter), the Class Teachers and the Subject teachers (via College Planner). State law also requires a parent to complete an application for Exemption from School.

TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT: We thank you for your support with our **end of the day student pick up**. It is running relatively smoothly and with minimal negative impact to our neighbours. We do ask that your daughter remains with you as you walk past driveways. It is very dangerous when students are running down the footpath ahead of their parents, to parked cars.

UNIFORMS: Our school has a **uniform policy** and it is very important that all students wear it correctly. The **jumper is not to be worn to school without the blazer**. The dress can be worn without a blazer or jumper and they may wear the blazer without a jumper. Teachers will be checking uniforms this week. We still have some items of unnamed clothing.



Ideas for Creating a Growth Mindset Environment at Home PT 2

- Praise what your child does, not who she is Praise perseverance and resiliency when you see your child struggle or face a challenge.
- Avoid praising marks and grades. Focus on praising work ethic and effort – not achievement in isolation.
- Adopt the word 'yet' into your vocabulary. "I can't do it yet but I will continue to try new strategies and put in a good effort until I can."
- Avoid comparing your child's success with siblings or friends – achievement is not a competition. There is enough success for everyone

News from Year 12

Significant events in the life of St Dominic's punctuate the rigour and routine of school life for Year 12 students, and in a sense, take on added meaning given the extra roles the senior students play or simply because it's the 'last time'. Amongst these Term One events are the Retreat, the Investiture Mass, Field Day, and most recently, Sports Day. The 12 PC team make a special point of encouraging the senior girls to involve themselves wholeheartedly in these events and see them as complementary to their academic pursuits. For some girls, whose strongest talents lie outside of the classroom, these events represent *their* time to shine.

PASTORAL CARE: TERM ONE 'STOCK TAKE': In


Pastoral care recently, I made a presentation to the girls that took the form of a 'Term 1 Stocktake'. In essence, I posed a series of question to the Year 12 students. The aim was to get them to reflect on where they were at after the early part of Year 12. I asked them to find the 'good' in what they were doing, as well as to be mature enough to acknowledge areas for improvement and to perhaps 'recalibrate' where necessary.

- SOCIALLY AT SCHOOL: how were they presenting themselves to staff and peers? What were their actions and attitudes saying about themselves?
- ACADEMICALLY: Were they up to date? Were they seeking help when needed? Were the expectations held by themselves and others both ambitious and realistic?
- AWAY FROM SCHOOL: did they have a study spot for uninterrupted work? How was their relationship with other family members going? Were outside interests [eg employment, sport, hobbies, social events] being given too little or great a priority in achieving a balanced life?

TERM ONE REPORTS: The Year 12 girls will receive their Term One reports at the end of next week. The mention of reports naturally evokes hopes for success or fears of otherwise. The Yr 12s are more aware than ever of the significance and finality of all their results this year. Often, the greatest value of the Term One report emanates from the comments from the subject teachers, rather than focussing on the grade itself. With this in mind, I'd like to draw attention to assertions made by our Educational Psychologist, Kirrilie Smout recently. Kirrilie is the Director of Developing Minds Psychology and Education. The school has engaged her services for a number of years. She presents a seminar to the girls once a term and tailors sessions to match the particular demands of the time of year. Kirrilie's first session focused on organisation and motivation; she spoke about how our brains work and how in fact we can retrain our brains throughout life to make ourselves more efficient and productive

WHAT DETERMINES HOW SUCCESSFUL A STUDENT IS ACADEMICALLY?

Pastoral Care in Week 6 featured the first of three seminar presentations by Kirrilie Smout. Kirrilie challenges the myth that school results are inexorably linked to 'how smart' a person is. Research demonstrates that a student's



results are only 30% determined by IQ or 'intelligence'. What students *actually do* is far more significant, contributing 70%

towards a person's results. *Behaviours and actions* are far larger determinants of success than innate *skills and abilities*. This can be a confronting scenario for students, but it needn't be. The key point is that students have a huge say in their ultimate academic success regardless of real or imagined inhibiting factors. Thus we encourage all our Yr 12s to access the supports available. The rewards will follow.

To aid the girls in their quest for personal excellence, some strategies and skills have been presented to them by Kirrilie to help them to be motivated, organised and energized in the first place.

- 1. Assume you will forget things: it's impossible to remember every deadline, timeframe or requirement. Effective use of the College planner will reduce the need to remember things and thus reduce stress.
- **2.** *Minimise distractions:* identify those things that are 'distracters' and make them just that bit harder to access. Don't rely on will power alone; make it harder to access the distractions in the first place.
- **3.** *Chunk:* break large, imposing, intimidating tasks into smaller achievable 'bits'.
- 4. *Daydream:* remind yourself why you are undertaking Year 12 in the first place and the doors a great ATAR can open up. Get the crystal ball out and look into the future, just before Christmas 2017 when final results are published. Imagine the joy of discovering your ATAR is higher than you'd anticipated, all that work back early in the year has paid off. Conversely, imagine the disappointment of knowing, deep down, that the ATAR you ended up with could have been better, if only...

University need not be the destination of choice in 2018 for all students, but the principle of every girl achieving her personal best remains the same.

Kirrilie's website can be found at **www.developingminds.net.au** where current thinking and research is on offer. Additionally, part of the programme run by Kirrilie is giving the girls the opportunity to personally email Kirrilie. I know a number of girls do this each year and are glad they did.

At the Parent Information evening I emphasised the importance of communication between school and home. I would like to take this opportunity to encourage all parents to contact subject teachers, class teachers or myself should you wish to discuss a matter, raise an issue or simply to get a quick update. There is no need to wait for Parent–Teacher Interviews; they are still several weeks away. In Year 12 we always welcome communication from parents at any point the need is felt.

AMSI Screening of "Hidden Figures" for Year 11 Physics & Specialist Math

On the 28th of March, the **Year 11 Physics** and **Specialist Math** classes attended an exclusive screening of *Hidden Figures* at the Capri Theatre, hosted by the **Australian Mathematical Sciences Institute (AMSI)**.

Upon arriving at the theatre, secondary students from various schools were enlightened by three guest speakers that discussed the application of **Science**, **Technology**, **Engineering and Math (STEM)** in their occupation and the importance of mathematics particularly in the careers of the future. The need for women in STEM occupations was highlighted by the inspiring story of three African American women working for NASA in preparation to launch the first man to the moon. In spite of gender inequality and racial discrimination in the 1960s, Katherine, Dorothy and Dwight overcome these challenges to excel in their STEM based careers and consequently inspire other women to do so. As a result of viewing *Hidden Figures*, the Year 11 students have attained a newly found sense of empowerment to make a change in the world through perusing STEM subjects in school and beyond.



Congratulations to the winners and to all teams who participated in this Project Compassion initiative.








Social Justice Club: Girls' Unity Picnic
