

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Dear Families,

The first Newsletter for Term 3 aims to share information with you focusing on 'Child Protection & Child Safeguarding'.

CHILD PROTECTION & CHILD SAFEGUARDING @ SDPC

Child protection and child safeguarding is mandated and is embedded in St Dominic's Priory College's governance, leadership, and culture. This is through the implementation of clear policies, formal training and following documented processes to keep the girls in our care safe. Child protection and child safeguarding is a shared responsibility and applies to all adults in our community; the College Board, Staff, Volunteers, Contractors, Parents / Guardians and Visitors.

CHILD PROTECTION CURRICULUM

Many would agree that our Pastoral Care Program is a hallmark of the College. Our student-centred focus around child protection and safeguarding is unique, with each girl having a double lesson of Pastoral Care timetabled into her learning program each week. This means each girl learns to understand that she has the right to always feel protected and cared for and this is reinforced regularly. Our teaching and learning programs use child friendly language, research and resources to equip the girls with tools they can use, should they need help.

Alongside, our Student Counsellor, Mrs Georgia Meyer shares information about one aspect of this program; 'The Child Protection Checklist'. This is completed annually by all students.

NEWS FROM THE STUDENT COUNSELLOR

TEACHING CHILD PROTECTION AT ST DOMINIC'S PRIORY COLLEGE

STUDENT UPDATE OF CHILD PROTECTION CHECKLIST

Each year in Term 3, as part of the Child Protection Program at St Dominic's Priory College, the girls are asked by the Pastoral Care Teachers to update their Child Protection Checklist on their computer or device. In the Junior classes, students are asked to write the names of 5 people who they could talk to if needed and who they feel comfortable to ask for support. These names are recorded on a hand template and used for reference if needed.

At this point of the year, as a way of keeping themselves safe we have a conversation with each class, to ensure each girl has the names and phone numbers of 5 people they feel comfortable to contact, in times of crisis. Each year the names that the girls have on their checklist may change - hence the reason we update their list each year. As the Student Counsellor, I always offer my name as one of those support people, if they choose to add it.

I recommend you refer to page 20 of the College Planner as it summarizes the process and also includes the names and numbers of other support services.

In this Child Protection approach we ask the girls to consider the three 'Ts';

- o **Trust** their gut feeling
- o **Talk** to someone they trust
- o **Take control** of what they can do to reach a satisfactory outcome

The girls receive an extensive education here at the College around child safe practices, in teaching girls to identify when they are at risk from themselves or from others and to take swift action.

The program has been developed as a result of the outcome of the *Royal Commission into Child Sexual Abuse* and all the staff at the College are well rehearsed, as they are mandated notifiers.

We work to raise each girl's awareness in identifying the risks in the areas of:

- o Physical abuse
- o Emotional abuse
- o Sexual abuse
- o Neglect
- o Victimization

We stress the importance of learning to be assertive and not be passive and of course always to let someone know when things aren't right.

We hope that as parents you will support this process of educating the girls and hope you too will reinforce these teachings at home, encouraging your child/ren to keep themselves safe at all times and teaching them the skills and strategies they need, as they navigate their way through life.

LEARNING ABOUT FOOD!

Term 3 will engage the Year 1 girls in learning about food in a range of ways. We will be investigating healthy foods, where different foods come from and the properties of foods; for example that some foods can change in state. We will be 'Mini Master Chefs' for a day and have the opportunity to share with the class, a recipe that we have cooked ourselves, at home. Looking at food advertisements is another way we will inquire into how food is part of our everyday lives.

In the very short time we have had a school this term so far, we have set up our own Pizza Shop and made our own pizzas! Having a Pizza Shop in our classroom enables us to engage in learning in a range of areas including Maths, Oral Language, The Arts, Health, Italian and Technologies. The girls have enjoyed role playing in the shop and creating pizzas to serve customers, problem solving by inventing new menu items, taking orders on note pads and calculating totals for paying customers. It really has been a hive of activity to start our unit of work this term and we look forward to all the learning to come.



YEAR 11 COORDINATOR'S REPORT

Greetings once again from the Year 11 Coordinator and PC team

PASTORAL CARE - TERM 2 IN REVIEW

The Year 11s at St Dom's have been treated to an action packed and fun filled Pastoral Care Program in Term 2.

We started the term with a session on study skills from an outfit called **Elevate Education**. They presented some good strategies on how students can summarise, synthesise and recall information relevant to each of their subject areas. The students found this both informative and helpful as they prepared for their midyear exams.

We are fortunate in our year level to have PC teachers and mentors for our students who are enthusiastic, knowledgeable and adept at delivering the pastoral care program.

Year 11N PC teacher, Mr Jonathon Hainsworth prepared an excellent session on the effects of listening to music on student's ability to study and complete homework. The students were both amused and informed by the creative way this information was delivered and the research that has been done in this area. It seems that on a whole, listening to music whilst performing tasks requiring a higher level of cognition is a distraction and can lead to inefficiencies... who would have thought!?

In Week 4, Mrs Sandra Mason (11G PC teacher), researched and put together a fantastic presentation on financial literacy and wellbeing for our students. From saving to spending and everything in between, the presentation was both interesting and highly valuable for students as they start to earn their own money and become financially independent.

ST DOM'S SISTER PROGRAM

Another highlight of the term was our Week 5 St Dom's Sister Program where the Year 11s worked with the Year 7s to put together 300 birthing kits for women in developing countries.

The Year 11 SRC students delivered a presentation demonstrating to the Year 7s how to make a birthing kit. Each kit included soap, string, gauze, gloves and a scalpel, and had to be assembled in such a way so as to be transported overseas easily.

The whole event gave the Year 11s an opportunity to get to know and mentor the Year 7 students whilst making a product of benefit for those less privileged than ourselves. This is truly in the St Dom's tradition.



CAREERS EDUCATION



In order to prepare for Year 12 subject choices in Term 3, Ms Louise Eustace, our Careers and VET teacher, organised a Mini-Careers Expo for all Year 10-12 students, to obtain information from different tertiary institutions within Adelaide. There were many options and courses presented to students, which gave them the opportunity to think on and consider the path they may take after school.

Of course Year 11 examinations heralded the end of Semester 1. As usual, the students were exemplary in the way they coped with the stress and organised themselves to get the job done.



EXCURSION AU ZOO D'ADÉLAÏDE: FRANÇAIS 8ÈME ANNÉE

On Friday 18 June, the combined Year 8 French classes attended the Adelaide Zoo for a French-inspired visit. The students were sent off in groups of 4 or 5 and tasked with completing a booklet in French about the various animals, their characteristics, place of origin, habitat and whether or not they are classified as endangered.


Our girls set off on their quest working collaboratively and with their usual enthusiasm to find the answers to the various questions. As they toured the zoo they were fascinated by the pandas, the miniature hippo, the chimpanzees giraffes and many others.

At one point one of the students approached us and in some distress showed us a sheet of paper torn out of her booklet. She explained that one of the cheeky goats had grabbed it and she'd been able to salvage only that one page!

In one corner of the zoo we discovered a bronze bust of famous French navigator and explorer, Nicolas Baudin, who charted parts of southern Australia in 1802 and collected specimens of native flora and fauna for the Musée des Sciences Naturelles in Paris.

This excursion complemented the "animals" theme which the classes explored in the second half of Term 2. It was an opportunity to visit this well-loved attraction from a different perspective, covering not only French language skills but also science, geography, history and the environmental issues which threaten some of our planet's precious animals.

Embroidery Exhibition ON NOW AT THE DAVID ROCHE FOUNDATION ADELAIDE HOUSE MUSEUM

A JOY TO BEHOLD!

The St Dominic's Priory College community is warmly encouraged to visit the David Roche Foundation Adelaide House Museum. The current exhibition, "Embroidery- Oppression to Expression", features - on loan from the St Dominic's Priory Convent Museum - the stunningly beautiful embroidered Benediction



Cope completed, circa 1890, by two of the pioneer Sisters from Stone in Staffordshire. These gifted English embroiderers are our Foundress, Mother Rose Columba Adams, and Mother Francis Philomena Ullathorne.

Also featured in this remarkable exhibition are, as advertised, "exquisite embroideries from across the centuries embracing contemporary textile practice in Australia and traditional European styles e.g. English Regency to William Morris, and the couture of Paolo Sebastian, and embroideries of animals collected by David Roche."

At the launch of the Exhibition, PhD student Jodie Vandeeper gave an outstanding talk on her research into the ateliers (workshops) operating in the North Adelaide Dominican and Anglican parish communities in Adelaide.
